#### **Barbie Mania**

There have been over 40 animated Barbie movies since 1987, but this year's Barbie movie was the first live-action version. The new Barbie movie has been extremely popular. Most of the visitors to the Quinlan Museum admit they have seen it. Susan Quinlan went with some of the members of the Santa Barbara Doll Club where she wore one of her vintage Barbie shirts from years ago.



Seeing a movie of human actors is one thing, but seeing the real thing – actual Barbies – is what it is all about. All of the Barbies in the Quinlan Museum love to have visitors who want to reminisce

about the days they played with them. They also enjoy hearing Susan Quinlan explain about their origin, history and roles played in doll collections as part of her tours for visitors. Barbies can be found in various sections of the three museum galleries. In the Toy Hall of Fame Display there are two of Susan's favorite Barbies – Pink Splendor and Billions of Dreams. There are also the three Russian Faberge Barbies and some of her favorite Bob Mackie designed Barbies.





Some of Barbie's original furniture is also on display. It is mid-century modern, a period that fits right in with current buying and decorating favorites of house buyers. It was originally made to be used by 8" or 10" dolls, but Barbie was so tall that she needed her own bed. The couches could be transformed into beds for the smaller dolls by dropping down the backing behind the cushions.



Another display in the California section of the museum has Barbies that have a specific connection of this state, such as Malibu Barbie, California Dream Barbie, Cali Girls Barbie, Sees Candy Barbie, and San Francisco FAO Schwartz Barbie.



Additional Barbies appear in other display cases as well, such as, James Dean, Lucille Ball, Elvis Presley, Cher, Frank Sinatra, Diana Ross, Barbara Streisand, The Osmonds, and other celebrities.



So if you are feeling nostalgic after the movie, and all of your Barbies have left you, come to the museum and take a walk down memory lane. You may see some of your other old favorites as well. There also are lots of collectable 10-20 year old Hallmark Barbie Christmas ornaments in the museum gift shop.

- Enjoy the large painted murals of dolls and teddy bears in Santa Barbara scenes on the walls and teddy bear clouds painted on the ceiling

- Personal tour of the Museum conducted by the owner Susan Quinlan upon request

Directions: Driving to Santa Barbara from the north or south on Highway US 101, and take the Carrillo St. exit (exit 98). Go east along Carrillo St. for three blocks to De La Vina St. Turn right and go one block to Canon Perdido St. Turn left and go a half-block to the Museum at 122 W. Canon Perdido St. There is street parking and **75-minute free parking** at the 50 W. Canon Perdido St. garage, across from Paseo Nuevo Shopping Mall and a block from the Museum. The entire Museum is handicap accessible.

#### Free and Discounted Museum Admission

To give you a reason to get out of the house during the Christmas season, the Museum currently offers free admission to the Museum for senior citizens and 50% discounts to all others (\$3.50 adults and \$2.00 children).

#### **Private-By-Appointment Museum Admission**

The museum is open to the public 11am to 4pm on Friday and Saturday, or you can leave a message at (805) 687-4623 or sq@quinlanmuseum.com to make an appointment for a **private visit to the museum with exclusive access** on Sunday through Thursday for you, family and friends. Just leave your phone number and the desired date/time of your visit, and Susan will return your call with a confirmation.

## Free Dolls and Bears for Children

Children accompanying adults receive a **free doll or teddy bear of their choice** as part of the Museum's annual tradition of offering Christmas gifts to children for spending the day with their parent or grandparent.

### **Christmas Shopping**



Avoid the crowded stores and consider doing some Christmas shopping at the Quinlan Museum where you will find:

- An intimate Museum Gift Shop with toys, dolls, teddy bears, books and magazines, many not found anywhere else in California or on the Internet (\$2 to \$700)
- Discounted Christmas items sales table, e.g., Santas, ornaments, dolls and bears (\$1 to \$40+)
- "Drastically Reduced Price" sales tables with dolls and teddy bears (\$1 to \$40+)



Unable to visit Santa Barbara? Shop at the Museum online store at www.quinlanmuseum. com/store where you will find many hard to find books, doll and teddy bear related items, at prices generally below market prices (assuming you can find them). Nearly 50% of the items are \$30 or less. So far there are over 200 items available at the online store and only one of each is available in 98% of the time. Having been in storage for so many years to make them more collectable and scarce, 90% of the merchandise is over 20 years old and in new condition (often still in boxes). Some items like books date back to pre-1920s. The merchandise includes doll and teddy bear books, pop-up books, vintage dolls, doll clothing and accessories, artist and vintage teddy bears, jewelry, Christmas/Easter/Halloween items, miniature dolls and accessories, and more.

## **Donations of Dolls, Bears or Collections**



#### **Doll Donation**

In May the museum received a donation of oriental dolls from Sally Blackford Luna. One of the dolls belonged to her mother and is about 70 years old (doll on the left).



In addition she donated a Japanese Hina Ningyo (Girl's Day) doll collection that her family had for close to 50 years. To display all of the dolls, our permanent exhibits need to be changed in order to accommodate the stands custom made for the collection.



## **Doll Periodical Donation**

Recently the museum received a gift of several hundred doll books and a very large

collection of doll periodicals from Martha Etchart. They belonged to her mother, Marilyn Childs, a well-known local collector who belonged to the Fiesta City Doll Club. Many of the periodicals will be used to fill in gaps in the extensive library collection.
